


Reading Action Program (RAP) Planning Guide

Overview

Literacy is the essential foundation for participation in our global society. GETTING STARTED

Organizing a Reading Action Program project for your club or district can result in a rewarding service experience for your club. Here are a few key steps to plan a successful literacy project in your area:

STEP 1:

CREATE A PLANNING COMMITTEE


The Reading Action Program is an important opportunity for you to help bridge the gaps in literacy and education in your community. Your team can help others to work toward their full potential and equip themselves with the skills needed to gain employment, support their families and enjoy a lifelong journey of learning. But first, you'll need to create a planning committee consisting of dedicated volunteers and community partners to help drive the success of your project. Together, the committee can develop a plan of action, share the work, and help motivate others to join your efforts. You might want to consider asking community organizations, local educators and literacy agencies to get involved, and designate a chair to lead the committee's efforts.

STEP 2:

CHOOSE YOUR PROJECT

Select a Reading Action Program project that helps meet a community need and reflects the interest of club members. You may need to complete a community needs assessment to determine where your assistance is most needed.

Perhaps you will decide to focus on reading and school readiness to help prepare young children to succeed in school. You may choose to provide access to information and technology in areas where Internet service is not available or affordable. Or, you may wish to provide tools and resources to help people with visual impairments to read and write.



Find a project that will be well suited for your community.

When developing your project, make sure it is a hands-on, highly visible activity. Perhaps your club already has a literacy project that can be expanded to increase public awareness and engage other community members. Some examples include:

- Develop a pre-school reading program
- Organize a book and/or computer drive for your local library or school
- Supply backpacks and school supplies to children in need
- Organize vision and hearing screenings for children and their parents
- Tutor adults in reading, math or science
- Supply a Brailler or Braille books to families in need

To ensure the success of your project, be sure to set specific goals that you would like to accomplish by the project's conclusion. Some examples are:

- Hold a vision screening for 200 children at a local school; present each child with an age-appropriate book
- Organize a community "literacy event" with proceeds used for the purchase of computers for an adult tutoring program
- Partner with a Leo club or other youth group to collect donated school supplies to fill 300 school backpacks for underserved children.

STEP 3:

PUBLICIZE YOUR PROJECT

Inform the local community about your Reading Action Program project and give your club or district the recognition it deserves! Invite community members to join you.

Consider:

- Posting flyers
- Contacting local radio or public access television stations
- Sending press releases to community newspapers before and after your project
- Posting project information on your club or district's Website or other social networking sites such as Facebook
- Inviting local media to cover your event

STEP 4:

IMPLEMENT YOUR PROJECT

Engage your club members! Inviting family members, friends and co-workers to help can also generate new membership interest.

Throughout the duration of your project, make sure someone is ready to answer questions from volunteers, elected officials, special guests, local media and other members of the community. Because your project will focus on education and literacy, consider asking educators, school administrators or other local experts on your planning committee to serve as spokespersons for highlighting this project and its importance to the growth of the community.



STEP 5:

TELL US ABOUT YOUR PROJECT

Throughout the year, we will feature stories and photos on the LCI Blog related to the Lions Reading Action Program. STEP 6:

CELEBRATE YOUR SUCCESS

Remember to share your accomplishments with people who helped make your project a success. Distribute a news release to local media and send a newsletter to community members who supported your project. You may want to present a certificate of completion as well as a thank you note in recognition of those that participated. Hosting a volunteer and partner awards ceremony is also a nice way to recognize everyone's contributions. And, don't forget to share your success with your Lions family - post photos on the Lions Facebook Fan Pages.

- Hold a monthly reading challenge for children at your library (encouraging them to read a designated number of minutes every month to win a prize)
- . Work with a deaf education teacher to organize a book reading group for children or adults who
- . Volunteer at an after school program to tutor a child in reading
- . Donate computers or other technology for learning to a local school, community center or library
- . Work with your local school or library to increase access to information in braille
